June 14 Chanceux Saxophone Quartet

"The Chanceux Saxophone Quartet was founded in 2016 at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. They serve as a premiere, in demand student performance ensemble for the university, having performed as a part of the UW-Whitewater saxophone studio recitals, their own recital, and recently performed the concerto "Capriccio" by Warren Barker with the University Community Band. They frequently perform for UW-Whitewater Music Department events such as audition days, open houses, and tours.

June 21 Steve Meisner

Steve Meisner is a multi-talented musician, entertainer, composer & arranger. He began playing the accordion at the age of 5 and has been earning a living in the music business since the age of 16. Steve's family has a rich musical heritage and he is a second-generation full-time working musician. His father, the late Verne Meisner, had a successful music career for over 57 years. Steve's brand of music is extremely versatile and appealing to a wide audience. He has made a name for himself by taking the music he grew up with from his father and adding his own imagination and feeling. He has brought his brand of traditional American polka into the 21st century with a fresh spark & swing while retaining the roots of this music.

In Steve's 40 year musical career he has performed with the nation's top accordionists, polka icons & musicians including Myron Floren, Frank Yankovic,

Joey Miskulin, & Verne Meisner. He has amassed 22 LP/CD credits, 6 Single, and 7 Video releases with full production credits. He has performed nationally coast to coast and internationally averaging as many as 250 performances annually including performances at the Lawrence Welk Theater in Branson MO, Stardust-Monte Carlo-Hacienda-Orleans & Plaza Casino's in Las Vegas. He has performed at the Library of Congress, the Kennedy Center, and the Smithsonian Folklife Festival on the National Mall in Washington DC. He and the Meisner brand of music has filtered into television broadcasts and motion pictures including TNN's Crook & Chase Show and the ABC Network 4th of July broadcast of "In Search of America, a 4th of July Celebration" hosted by the late Peter Jennings and folklorist Nick Spitzer. He and his music are featured a full-length motion picture "Chump Change" released internationally by Miramax and he has been heard and seen on the film festival circuit in a short film called "The Pick Up Polka". He has an original composition in the independent full-length feature "Red Betsy". Writer/



director/actor Steve Burrows from Hollywood CA call's Steve "the Mozart of Polka".

Steve has received numerous awards and nominations including "Musician and Band of the Year", "Favorite Polka Artist", "Lifetime Achievement award" by the Maryland Accordion Club, he resides as the 29th induc-

tee to the Ironworld Polka Hall of Fame, and in 2005 an "Honor Roll" induction to the Wisconsin Polka Hall of Fame, he is the first of his generation to reside alongside his father as a "Lifetime Achiever" in the National Cleveland-Style Polka Hall of Fame in 2012. He, and his father's original compositions are included on many best-selling polka recordings, Grammy nominated recordings, and can be found in the archives of the Library of Congress, the Kennedy Center, the Smithsonian Institute, and Wisconsin

state libraries in both textbook and music categories. His recordings are used in preschool and kindergarten classes to teach the young and enjoyed by many generations bringing back memories of care-free days.

June 28 Jazz Camp

The UW-Whitewater Jazz Camp Combos are groups formed as part of the summer jazz camp held every

year. These talented students come from the Midwest for a week-long jazz intensive camp. The UW-Whitewater Jazz Camp is highly



respected throughout the Midwest with top nationally-known jazz faculty that join with the staff to form an Adult Jazz Ensemble, specifically to complement the student summer jazz camp.

July 12 Rose Among Thorns

Called A Rose Among Thorns, this quartet of local musicians offers pleasing melodies, tight musicianship,

and stirring renditions of songs from folk, pop, blues, country, and Celtic traditions. The foursome includes Jeff Mason on acoustic guitar, bass, and vocals; Perry Baird on vocals and acoustic guitar; Tom Cook on bass, mandolin, banjo, and a host of other stringed instru-



ments; and Angela Martin Licari on violin and vocals. Fort Atkinson natives Jeff and Perry played as solo acts and as a duo in the mid-1980s, renewing their musical partnership about five years ago. Tom, retired band teacher at Fort High School, came on board in 2015, and a violin was added in 2016, with Angela capably taking over that duty last year. All are familiar to local audiences as members of other musical ensembles, some of which include Jeff with the Merry Horde, Expanded Waist Band, and Blue Stew; Perry

with The Buzzards; Tom with Madison Brass and Guitarcheology; and Angela with Madpolecats. The Rose Among Thorns collaboration gives each a chance to contribute favorite—often eclectic—songs for interpretation by the group. Songs featuring moving stories and themes, energetic instrumentals, soothing vocals, and singable choruses are all part of typical Rose Among Thorns musical sets.

July 19 Brass Knuckles

Brass Knuckles Brass Quintet with Percussion is comprised of professional musicians who are also

educators and have taught in public schools, universities, and colleges, as well as teaching in a private lesson studio. The musicians' variety in performance background venues



lends to a wide variety of styles in their repertoire. Their experiences include other brass ensembles, concert bands, touring bands, jazz ensembles, drum and bugle corps, percussion ensembles, and orchestras. All have been on numerous recordings with a variety of ensembles, and will be recording their first Knuckles CD in 2019. They currently are available for concerts, weddings, wedding receptions, parties, memorials, special events, school events, and anything else you can imagine and Savory Sounds is excited to have them perform on the series.

The Whitewater Arts Alliance is enthusiastically seeking artists to participate in the "Making Magic with Mixed Media" show at the Cultural Arts Center, 402 West Main Street, during the month of August 2018.

Show organizers are looking forward to receiving a wide variety of entries from artists working in 2-D or 3-D.



In this first-of-its-kind show at the Whitewater CAC, mixed media is broadly defined to include the creation of pieces of art using more than one medium -- acrylics, oil, watercolor, pastels, pen & ink, pencil, etc. -- to acrylic with collage, oil

and cold wax, assemblage, etc. The options can be as narrow or broad as one's imagination. The Whitewater Arts Alliance is excited to provide a showcase where this magical art will be featured and celebrated.



The goal of this exhibit is to stimulate interest in mixed media among our artists. Artwork must be completed within the last two years and not previously exhibited at the Cultural Arts Center.

"Making Magic with Mixed Media" will run from Thursday, August 2 to Sunday, August 26. The CAC will be open from Noon to 5 p.m. every Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday during that time. A few mixed media demonstrations will be held at the CAC in August, dates and times to be determined. The closing reception will be held at the CAC on Sunday, August 26 from 1 to 3 p.m. Artists may pick up their pieces after the 2:30 p.m. awards presentation.

Awards: Award of Excellence I - \$200, Award of Excellence II - \$100, Award of Excellence III - \$75, Humerous Interpretation Award - \$50, Peoples Choice Award - \$50, and Honorables.

Commissions and Sales: 20% commission for WAA members and 30% commission for non-members. Sales will be handled by WAA. Sales tax is the responsibility of the artist.

Featured Artist—Mike Dugan

I started playing trombone in elementary school, however this wasn't my first encounter with the instrument. My grandpar-

ents had a trombone in their attic that belonged to my Uncle John. Rumor is that I would take the instrument out of the case as a youngster (4 years old) and march around the house with it.

Come 8th grade, I wasn't sure that playing an instrument was for me. Thankfully my parents told me to stick with it and that I could make a decision to quit after freshman year of high school. My band director, Jeff Childs, just happened to be a fantastic trombone player and gave the high school jazz en-

semble a lot of attention. It was then that I started to find my people and enjoy playing. Fast forwarding through high school, I had the opportunity to attend Birch Creek for jazz camp, play in the Chicago Youth

Symphony and take pri-

vate lessons.

It wasn't until I sat down in the CYSO for the first time that I realized how much fun it was to play. I then decided to major in music and attended DePaul University in Chicago. After DePaul, I attended graduate school

at the University of Akron and the University of Minnesota. After I finished my MM degree at Minnesota, I took a job with one of the Air Force bands. I spent 4 great years

performing all throughout New England, New York and New Jersey.

> Something changed about half-way through my enlistment, I was bitten by the teaching bug. Part of our job in the band involved master classes at high schools and colleges. It was the collegelevel masterclasses that I enjoyed the most.

Around the time I needed to decide to reenlist, I called my trombone teacher/advisor at the University of Minnesota to see how long it would take to get a DMA. I found out I had a year's worth of coursework

to finish, a few recitals and then the final doctoral project. It was tough leaving the steady gig with the Air Force, but it felt like the right thing to do.

So Jessie, Colin and I packed up and moved back to Minneapolis. I finished my DMA and started performing regularly with the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra and the Minnesota Orchestra.

To this day, the oppor-

tunities to play with those world-class orchestras remain as some of my favorite musical memories. Then, in 2007, I applied for a job at this little school in Wisconsin.

They were looking for a half-time trombone teacher, which seemed like it could work for our growing family. I commuted to

Whitewater from Minnesota that first year. I was only teaching on Monday and Tuesday, so it worked out.

Ethan was now in the picture, Jessie was working as a pharmaceutical sales rep, and I was also covering a leave of absence in the Minnesota Orchestra, so things were busy. Thankfully we had a great network of folks in the Twin Cities to help us out. As I was putting the finishing touches on my doctoral

project and was finding that I needed experience and a doctorate to land a full-time, tenure-track job. The half-time gig at UW-Whitewater was the perfect way to get my foot in the door while I finished up my DMA.

I finished my doctorate, applied for the job here again at UW-W when it became tenuretrack in 2009, and here we are. I'm not go-

ing up to the Cities anymore to perform but am lucky to play with our faculty brass quintet, the Isthmus Brass (look for our new Christmas album in November), and the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra.



My job at UW-W has changed quite a bit since 2007, for I am now the Chair of the Music Department.

My involvement with the WAA has been on a limited basis thus far. I feel that the WAA does a fantastic job promoting the arts and I see my role as a board member to help further the WAA's involvement with live music in our community. Our town in quite unique and the support for the arts is greater than one would think.

October at the CAC—Visionary Artists

In October 2018 the Visionary Artists show will be "Transitions".

"Transitions" reflects the resilience and versatility of the Visionary Artists group which formed in 2011. Three of the original members, Tom, Marilyn, and Barbara still remain. Other artists have come and gone, but all members (past and present) have made significant contributions along the way toward the goals and future of the group.

Currently, the members include John Dynkowski, Marilyn Fuerstenberg, Barbara Grant, Tom Jewel, Sylvia Linton, and Mary Nevicosi.

The exhibit reveals the influence the artists have had on each other as they have evolved, but it is fascinating to witness the tenacious way they have held on to their individual styles.

This exhibit explores "transitions" in subject matter such as the change of seasons, phases of growth, movement through space, and passage of time. "Transitions" is also shown in the artists' experiments with techniques and various media.

The group meets on a regular basis to discuss artistic concepts and to do positive critiquing of their recent works.

They are dedicated to enriching and expanding their individual artistic processes through the exchange of ideas that enable them to grow as artists. This ability to share in a trusting environment is key to their individual artistic endeavors as well as the groups' ongoing durability.

The Visionary Artists also work together to locate venues to hold group exhibits of their recent works.

They have achieved successful results through offering exhibits that reflect their individual styles and techniques.

In their exhibits, they provide the viewing public fresh, creative artwork in an array of media and subject selections that showcase their versatility as artists.

The group is creating a website, which will be launched soon.


